G.H. MOSSON is the author of two books of poetry, *Season of Flowers and Dust* (Goose River, 2007) and *Questions of Fire* (Plain View, 2009). His poetry has been nominated three times for the Pushcart Prize. Mosson reviews poetry for *The Broadkill Review* and lives in Maryland.

ALICIA MOUNTAIN received her MFA at the University of Montana. Her work has been published in *LIT*, *Prairie Schooner*, *Spillway*, *The Journal*, *Witness* and *Zone 3*. She won a 2014 Academy of American Poets College Prize and was a 2015 Idyllwild Fellow. Her first full length manuscript was a semi-finalist for the 2015 St. Lawrence Book Award.

LYNN PATTISON is the author of three collections: *tesla's daughter* (March Street, 2005); *Walking Back the Cat* (Bright Hill, 2005) and *Light That Sounds Like Breaking* (Mayapple, 2006). Her work has appeared in several anthologies, the most recent being *The Cento: A Collection of Collage Poems* (Red Hen, 2011). Pattison was awarded an Irving S. Gilmore Emerging Artist Grant through the local branch of the Michigan Arts Council and a writing residency at the Ragdale Foundation.

ANITA PINZI was born in Florence, Italy. She holds a PhD in Comparative Literature from the City University of New York. She has extensively researched Italian migration literature, writing her dissertation on contemporary Albanian-Italian literature. Among her publications are an interview with poet Gëzim Hajdari, "An Ode to Exile," the essay "Corpi-Cerniera," and the book chapter "The Translingual Poetic Subject." She resides in the British Virgin Islands, where she is an instructor at the H. Lavity Stoutt Community College.

AARON POCHIGIAN earned a PhD in classics from the University of Minnesota and is completing an MFA in poetry at Columbia University. His book of translations from Sappho, *Stung With Love*, was published by Penguin Classics in 2009. For his work in translation, he was awarded a 2010-2011 grant by the National Endowment for the Arts. His first book of poetry, *The Cosmic Purr* (Able Muse), was published in 2012, and several of the poems in it collectively won the New England Poetry Club's Daniel Varoujan Prize.
