ARTIST BIO

Using photography as an art form has been a part of my life throughout the various careers. Whenever I would travel I would extend the stay so I would have time for the art of exploration through large format (8X10 camera) photography. My early work concentrated on the cultural and natural landscape. My first exhibit was in the Baltimore Museum of Art and I have continued exhibiting my work in galleries and museums. I have also received two artist grants to create work for the Baltimore's Art in Public Spaces Program.

This new work submitted concentrates on a blend of interests in technology and how it allows me to visually describe and create previously unstudied imagery. These images were captured using a scanner as a camera. The work began as "look what technology can reveal" to my present command over technique to have it work for me and my intentions. Digital photography / technology is a vital and integral part of this process but is not what interests me most. The scanner is a tool that enhances my ability to observe. These images are about time, transformation and transitions. The new beauty of my subject twists its way out of the familiar. The expansive surrounding deep black becomes graphic shapes that isolate yet allow the subject to merge towards the viewer. It is that, teamed with my imagination that allows me to search, analyze, observe speculate, and capture the true essence of my investigations. Working with a flat bed scanner is not without limitations. New procedures and techniques push the artwork and demands growth as an artist. My imagination and determination in conjunction with a new understanding of patience constantly gives birth to new ideas. Concepts of composition and the decisive moment provide new rules to break.

Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History: Visiting Scholar /Artist 2007-2010 Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History October 2006-June 2007 The National Museum of Natural History presented my recent artwork of scans of three-dimensional objects (flora, fauna, and fossil specimens) in a solo exhibition named Transitions Photographs by Robert Creamer. The subject of this exhibit was observations of botanicals in the state of degradation. This event comprised 39-framed images with print sizes from 20x28 to 40X56 inches. A documentary video interviewing me and showing my innovative technique accompanied the exhibit. *The Smithsonian Magazine* (May 2007) presented my images and an in depth discussion on my work in an article, "What Camera?" by Marion Smith Holmes. Addition international recognition is in a photo essay in *Muy Intersante Magazine* in Madrid Spain.

This exhibit is now part of the Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibit Service (SITES) and was available for installation in museums for the next 3 years.

This particular award (\$26,000) was granted to me to produce 3 photographs (framed backlit transparencies 4'X 6') to be installed in the Garrison Middle School.

This commission was granted to me to produce 3, 7' X 9' backlit display transparencies to be incorporated into the design of the Clarence Du Burns Soccer Arena. This particular award (\$19,000) is installed in the halls along the open-air arena becoming part of the architecture.

WORK EXPERIENCE

1982-Present

Photographer Architectural Services

I am the sole proprietor of APS and perform services directed to architects, construction companies and graphic design firms. We produce photographs for architects for their portfolios, wall décor, www., and for publication. My pictures of house interiors and restaurants appear in book form and various publications. My award winning images are also used for design competitions. My most recent published book project is on the Prisoner of War Museum in Andersonville Georgia released in spring of 2000.

Over a period of 7 years I have had a contract with the National Park Service (Design Center, Harpers Ferry). This contract was a result of winning a national competition offered to find a photographer who would photograph throughout the United States. After a lengthy review process I was selected. I have traveled to various National Parks to photograph their new exhibit centers, historic buildings and furnishings, and, wayside exhibits including prominent views of the Park. Parks and National Sites photographed include the Washington Monument, Lincoln Memorial, Valley Forge, George Washington Birthplace, Martin Luther King Memorial and Birthplace in Atlanta, Allegheny Portage and Lemon Tavern, The Everglades, Andersonville Prison Camp, The Head Trails of Lewis and Clarke, Arches and Canyonlands in Utah, and Chamizal in Texas where the Rio Grande establishes the border between the US and Mexico. The pictures made become a record of the park for the park and are also used for public display, publication and on the Park Services web sites for those particular locations.

This expertise in exhibit photography has led to other museum work. This summer I photographed the new Morgan Pierpont Library in NYC. This Renzo Piano architect design, houses one of the world's finest collections of art and historical works. In February 2006 I photographed the recent renovation at the Alamo in San Antonio Texas. A trip to Louisville Kentucky included photographing the new Frazier Amour Museum. In December 1999 I was photographing the newly opened Getty Museum in Los

Angeles. My client was the exhibit designer who designed and fabricated the earthquake proof cabinets and wall units that housed various glass collections, marble statues and other rarities. For this same client I have photographed at the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City. In the summer of 1999 I photographed the new Samuel Harris Dental Museum in downtown Baltimore. I made on location views of the unique exhibits and also did studio photographs of historical objects that included George Washington's teeth (not wooden after all!) and Queen Elizabeth's dental kit. All of these images went into publication as the Museum's reference catalogue. Recent assignments have been at the Smithsonian Institute photographing the new Viking exhibition and the Buccellati jewelry collection exhibition. I have recently returned from a photo trip that took me to the Cleveland Art Museum to photograph mummies, Harvard University to photograph a rare Mercator Globe, and other collections at the Rhode Island School of Design Museum and the Maritime Museum in Virginia.

At the City Life Museum of Baltimore I was their photographer entrusted with printing their rare glass plate negatives. I produced images for their displays and also photographed exhibits for publication as post cards and catalogues. I did a rephotographic survey for the museum duplicating an earlier documentation of views by A. Aubrey Bodine.

In addition to on location photography I also am also very familiar with photographing in the studio. I have photographed executive portraits, models, catalogues, art objects and elaborate architectural models.
