The MFA was the first terminal-degree program in the English Department at Mason (1980). An undergraduate BFA in Creative Writing was launched as one of the few such programs in the country (2013). Today, the community consists of about 100 BFA students and 75 MFA students; I oversee all marketing, recruiting, onboarding, and academic advising; navigate matters with ten tenuretrack faculty members, numerous term faculty colleagues, support staff, the chair of the department, and the dean of the college; and manage a budget of \$1.3 million in graduate student funding, a corresponding \$700,000 in tuition waivers, \$30,000 in marketing and operating, \$20,000 in Provost Supplemental Funds, and a combined \$100,000 in Mason Foundation accounts and endowments that support scholarships, fellowships, additional tuition, and miscellaneous student funding requests and program expenses. Over time, the program developed various opportunities for students to expand and deepen their literary citizenship and knowledge of publishing: Fall for the Book literary festival (1998), Stillhouse Press (2014), the Cheuse Center for International Writers (2016), Poetry Daily (founded 1997, Mason 2019), Northern Virginia Writing Project (1978), and two acclaimed literary journals, phoebe (1971) and So To Speak (1993). Guided by award-winning faculty and accomplished publishing professionals, students graduate as emerging writers who are highly prepared to sustain writerly lives and attain career goals. In 2020, Watershed Lit was launched as a chartered center of the College of Humanities and Social Sciences, and the center serves as a collaborative hub for the entities mentioned above. Fall for the Book and Poetry Daily are registered 501(c)3 organizations with their own board governance and fundraising capabilities; I serve on the board of the former and act as executive director of the latter.
