## **BIO**

Dominic T. Moulden is the founder of Elephant Free School, a Black-centered laboratory of imagination and freedom. This location-independent academy offers political education as well as coaching and training in the following areas: resident-led community development; the Right to the City movement; equitable revitalization; cooperative economics; affordable housing; fundraising and resource organizing; organizing strategy; member recruitment; organizational development; shared leadership and workplace democracy; and more. Dominic also provides technical assistance to tenant associations, both emerging and established.

Tenure and sustainability in the community organizing sphere can be elusive, but Dominic has been organizing in Washington, DC for 33 years. In addition, he continues to organize in his hometown of Baltimore, where he is a caretaking councilmember of VOLAR (Village of Love and Resistance),

an equitable redevelopment and community wellness initiative. As the resource organizer of ONE DC, Dominic gathered, trained, and coordinated a 34-member team to spearhead the successful campaign to raise \$1.2 million to buy a building to permanently house the Black Workers and Wellness Center. In addition, Dominic will be collaborating with the National Black Worker Center Project to create a transformative curriculum for a leadership development program.

Since 2018, he has been providing technical assistance and coaching to community organizations in one of the oldest Black communities in Memphis toward creating a community-controlled land trust. He was a community representative on the Board of the DC-based New Columbia Community Land Trust and developed several housing cooperatives among them--Spirit of W Street, Voices of Madison, and Malcolm X Cooperatives as living examples of community control of land and housing.

# Why Elephant Free School?

Elephant is the guiding spirit for reasons myriad. Instead of avoiding the "elephant in the room," the Elephant Free School centers and elevates difficult yet generative conversations. Its motto is "memory, mourning, and migration." Memory: the elephant remembers, and is thusly the guardian of ancestral wisdom. Call their names: Claudia Jones, Lucy Parsons, Denmark Vesey, Gabriel Prosser, and countless more. We trumpet against amnesia, and Afrofuturistically stoke the memory of liberation. Mourning: we honor the incalculable loss of our lands and languages--and even our cosmologies, which we strive to re-member in ritual, in our bones, in our deathless desire for wholeness and return. Migration: it's natural to move about the face of the world, but forced displacement is unnatural and unjust. With this mobile educational initiative, let us reunite our herd so we may, together, find the watering holes of justice.
